"A Salute to the

Huron Lightship"

With the return of the robins each spring to our Lake Huron Shores, certain other visitations on our marine scene confirm the return of another season. In recent memory, the upbound passage of the Huron Cement steamer S.J. Crapo is our annual harbinger of spring. Such was the case again this mid-March with the Crapo's St. Patrick's Day passage.

In seasons past the reappearance of the familiar "Huron" Lightship was the signal of spring's arrival. From 1893 until August of 1970, the U.S. Lighthouse Service and later the U.S. Coast Guard stationed the "Huron" at the head of Lake Huron Cut, the channel leading from the lake into the St.

Clair River.

The first "Huron" was an 80 foot wooden craft, schooner-rigged, built at Toledo by the Craig interests in 1893 as Light Vessel No. 61. She was on station here from 1893 until 1920. The following year, a new "Huron" of 101 feet, built at Muskegon as Light Vessel No. 96, became part of our scene until she was withdrawn in 1934. The writer recalls this vessel as having been painted red, anchored on the east or Canadian side of the channel's upper limit. An uncle of mine, in his youth a summer resident of old Huronia Beach near what is now Lakeside Park, used to describe the lightship's location as about Buoys 3 and 4. In those early days, the "Cut" began over what we know as Corsica Shoal's location.

In 1935, our final "Huron", Lightship No. 103 (later designated by the U.S.C.G. as W A L 526) became our sentinel, a position she held until replaced by a buoy in August of 1970. She was originally a self-propelled steamer, built at Morris Heights, New York in 1921 at a cost of \$126,428.00. Extensively rebuilt in 1949 and converted to diesel, she initially sported a tall, thin stack. Her winter quarters were Detroit's Coast Guard Station at the foot of Mt. Elliot for many years, later changed to our Black River.

At the time of her retirement, the city of Grand Haven almost succeeded in claiming her as their "museum". However, local interests prevailed and she has been affixed to the Port Huron waterfront at Pine Grove Park for the past nineteen years. She was badly vandalized at that site in July of 1972 and since that time has been locked up to assure her safe-keeping.

To those of us who grew up with that lovely view of Lake Huron's sweep and majesty, the familiar silhouette of the "Huron" Lightship is still missed, the horizon somehow shallow without her; her spot out there made even more lonesome with the dramatic decline in general vessel traffic in recent years. On the brighter side, she still is with us, and, hope-

## "Rolling Rhubarb Punch"

- 8 cups diced, uncooked rhubarb, not  
peeled
  - 5 cups water
  - 2 cups honey or sugar
  - 6 oranges
  - 3 lemons
  - 1 quart ginger ale, chilled
- Simmer rhubarb in water until quite  
 mushy. Strain and measure liquid into  
 an enamel kettle. Add 1/3 cup of sugar  
 or honey for each cup of rhubarb juice.  
 Stirring over low heat, heat until  
 sugar or honey has dissolved. Cool. Add  
 Strained juice of oranges and lemons.  
 Chill. Before serving, add ginger ale.  
 Serve over ice cubes. Makes 3 1/2 quarts
