## Notice to Mariners... & Members



AFTER JAN. 16, 1982 A PIERHEAD LIGHT WILL BE ESTABLISHED AT THE ENTRANCE TO THE LEE M. COOPER GALLERY, AT THE MUSEUM OF ARTS & HISTORY, 1115 SIXTH ST., PORT HURON, APPROXIMATE LATITUDE 43°-00' N. LONG. 82°-25'W. THIS LIGHT WAS FORMERLY... ST. CLAIR FLATS CANAL LOWER, A FIXED RED LIGHT, ON THE SOUTH END THE PIER, 45 FEET ABOVE THE WATER AND WAS VISIBLE FOR 14 MI. IT WAS A 4TH ORDER LIGHT, OIL

IN REGULAR SERVICE LAMP IN RED OCTAGONAL TOWER BUILT IN 1871. (Note: Were using 1st original color, red, which in later years after the second pier was built was made a white light.)

The lamp came into the possession of Lake Huron Lore Member Peter Henkel, owner of St. Clair Flats Marina. It sat in Peter's engine shop for several years, always a thing of admiration to your editor, albeit there were missing prisms and it had seen better days... its next home was Capt. Ted Richardson's basement, where he and your editor were going to clean it up. Peter had given the Light to Lake Huron Lore and I guess that we were just waiting for some lighthouse historians to grow up. And grow up they did. I think that I have the story straight. Darla Van Hoey fell in love with the light and Mike, her husband, and I don't know which first... but we had the Great Lakes greatest light house buffs in love with our light and about to restore it to its former glory. This re-birth will be told by them on the evening of the sixteenth... its past history. and incidentally the history of the aids to navigation... on what for years was the controlling depth of the lake navigation system.

# Projects Report

## THE PILOT HOUSE

When the generous bequest of our late member Oswald Emig of St. Clair was received last year it was decided by your board of trustees to establish the Lake Huron Lore Memorial Fund that would be used for the purpose of furthering marine historical projects of the society. The principal project to date was to restore within the museum a Great Lakes steamer pilothouse. The actual project started last spring with the gathering of materials for the job. The past summer and fall were spent mostly in the planning stages of the project and securing volunteers to do the work. I am happy to report that the following NON-PAY contracts have been negotiated to date: The carpentry contract to member Bob Lester of marine City. I mention this first as this is where the work has shown up first. The entire pilot house has been framed in, windows, doors, etc, have been roughed in and are in . The mural of the head of the river and the foot of Lake Huron has been awarded to member Bob McGreevy, whom many of you know, a contemporary marine artist from Grosse Pointe. The mural lighting has been awarded to Ed Peterson, member of the board of trustees of the museum, not a member of Lake Huron Lore, but I think soon to be. . . . . The electrical control contract has been let to Frank Tabor, St. Clair (and as soon as he gets back from a three weeks vacation in Hawaii we expect to put him to work.) And the last but not least contract for painting and the high varnish finish that the old houses always had, to Gene Buel of Marine City. **THOSE WHOSE WORK KEEP THEM FROM VOLUNTEERING THEIR TIME. . . WE KNOW THAT IT IS HARD TO CO-ORDINATE VOLUNTEER TIME. . . MAY MAKE A MONETARY CONTRIBUTION TO THE MEMORIAL FUND OR DIRECTLY TO THE PILOT HOUSE PROJECT.** We have been able to make arrangements to use part time help of the museum crew and reimburse them rather than get into payroll problems of our own and any monetary contribution by the members or friends of the pilothouse project will be appreciated. Several have been made recently and they will all be recognized for permanent display in the pilothouse.

A real shot in the arm came this winter in making our pilot house authentic in the person of Mr. William Neal, president of the Port Huron Terminal Company. Mr. Neal gave Lake Huron Lore the equipment and materials from the pilot house and the officers quarters of the KINSMAN ENTERPRISE. These materials are being removed, those from the pilothouse will be immediately re-installed in our museum pilot house. Those from the officers quarters will be stored and used when more space becomes available. This will give the marine buffs of the future an excellent idea of the craftsmanship that went into the building of a ship at the turn of the century.

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## THE HISTORICAL FILES

Member Nan Allen has the historical files and has started to index them from their present form on to card index by ship. These files are from the Port Huron Times and the Port Huron Herald and give the day to day marine happenings in the marine world, both along the St. Clair River and the entire Great Lakes. The need for this sort of information becomes more apparent each day when one reads some of the articles that are turned in by the modern writers. Whether their work is the product of careless research or no research at all is hard to determine. . . . . but the fact that they have a dangerous amount of knowledge of the subject being written about is very clear!

Catherine Richardson has the file of pictures and we hope to be able to publish the list with the assistance of the Lake Huron Lore Memorial Fund in the near future.
